Twenty-fourth Sunday after Pentecost

The holy martyrs Aceptsimas the bishop, Joseph the priest, and Aeithalas the deacon.

Aceptsimas was eighty years old when the Persian king Sapor began the persecution of Christians in which Aceptsimas was seized. He was interrogated, thrown into prison with Joseph and Aeithalas, and then killed. They suffered in the fourth century. (4th century)

Foundation of the church of the holy great martyr George in Lydda, where his relics are kept.

This is the anniversary of the translation of the relics of the Great Martyr from Nicomedia to Lydda in Palestine. In the time of the emperor Constantine the Great, a beautiful church was built to house the relics. It remains a place of great pilgrimage.
